Facilitators who wish to offer the workshop so that the participants can ladder into the Douglas College Essential Skills Practitioner (ESPT) program will be required to deliver the workshop as presented in the Facilitator Guide and must meet Douglas College facilitator criteria.

Facilitator Criteria

Douglas College will maintain and publish a list of qualified facilitators who can deliver the workshop to ladder into the ESPT Program. In order to qualify, you will need to meet the following criteria:

Successful Completion of the ESPT Certificate Program (note, completion of "An Aboriginal Essential Skills Journey, Planting the Seeds for Growth" is preferred and may take place of the Intro to Essential Skills course)

Minimum one year facilitation experience

Letter of recommendation from an employer validating facilitation skills

Essential Skills Practitioner (ESPT) Certificate Program Overview

The Training Group at Douglas College offers Essential Skills courses designed to help educators, workplace trainers, human resource professionals and career practitioners understand and integrate Essential Skills into their work. All courses are designed to combine a balance of theoretical and interactive learning approaches and include small and large group activities as well as individual work. The program includes:

Process:

Facilitators:

Facilitators must deliver the workshop as presented in the Facilitator Guide
Successful completion will be awarded to participants who meet the following criteria:

- Attend all training
- Participate in small and large group discussions
- Complete the Activities

Facilitators will issue certificates of completion only to those participants who meet the above criteria. Facilitators will maintain records of participant completions, date of the workshop, location and other logistics. In the event that a student does not have their certificate of completion they will be asked to provide a letter stating successful completion from their facilitator so please ensure you maintain accurate records.

Students:

At the time a student registers for additional Essential Skills courses they will be required to submit a copy of their certificate of completion and their course outline (agenda). Requirements to complete the Introduction to Essential Skills course will then be waived.

Facilitator Application Process:

Interested applicants will be required to submit to the program coordinator:

1. ESPT Program Certificate
2. Letter stating how they meet the facilitation criteria
3. Letter of recommendation from an employer validating facilitation skills

Costs:

We recognize that facilitators may need to charge a fee to recover costs for their time to deliver and travel to/from the workshop.
